In-Person Worship Resumes Sunday, July 5

In-Person worship begins Sunday, July 5 at 10:00 a.m. with a maximum of 50 attendees. In light of the increased COVID-19 cases in Sangamon County and within

our country, it was decided to limit the number to 50 although the governor's mandate allows for more. Sunday's service will be live streamed for those who



choose to worship from home. Members and friends are invited to register through Signup Genius located on the homepage of our website. Those without internet access can call Jennie Alt to reserve a seat. The church will also use this information as contact tracing should an attendee test positive for coronavirus. Some other features and precautions as we re-gather include the following:

- Worshipers are required to wear facemasks at all times except while partaking of communion elements. If you are unwilling or unable to wear a mask, please plan to enjoy the services online. Masks will be available for those that need one, and hand sanitizer will be available as well. Please bring your own mask, however, if you have one.
- Social distancing will be required.
- Parking will be available at Graham Elementary School until our parking lot is available. For street parking near the church, priority will be given to those unable to walk from the school.
- Worshipers will enter the church through the West Narthex doors off Edwards Street and will be directed into the sanctuary through either the Tower Door or the door directly off the West Narthex.
- Ushers will direct family groups to sit together and will ensure families have appropriate distance from other families. Family members planning to sit together should enter the church together. Ushers will dismiss worshipers by row and by family group to minimize social contact.
- We will not be gathering in the West Narthex either before or after the service. Worshipers may gather outside the church to greet one another while utilizing social distancing measures.
- Bulletins will be available for pickup as you enter the sanctuary. Bulletins will contain all readings and hymns, so the use of Bibles and hymnals in the pews will be unnecessary.
- Offering plates will be available at the sanctuary entrances and will not be passed during the service.
- The congregation will not be singing hymns or reciting passages. This is due to video recording matters, as well as a desire to minimize virus spread.
- There will be no passing of the peace or any physical contact at any time.
- Communion elements will be available at the sanctuary entrances.
- Children will remain in the pews for the children's sermon. No in-person Sunday School.
- Restrooms are open and will be cleaned before and after the service.
- A member of the Safety Team will be available during the service.

WESTMINSTER BECOMES MATTHEW 25 CONGREGATION

In June, Session accepted the invitation by the PC(USA) to become a Matthew 25 congregation. This 2019 initiative invites congregations to recommit themselves to:



congregational challenging people and congregations to deepen their faith and get actively and joyfully engaged with their community and the world.

- Dismantling structural racism by advocating and acting to break down the systems, practices and thinking that underlie discrimination, bias, prejudice and oppression of people of color.
- Eradicating systemic poverty by working to change laws, policies, plans and structures in our society that perpetuate economic exploitation of people who are poor.

In light of Westminster's beginnings as an abolitionist church and with a renewed call within our country to address racism, Session's decision is timely.

224TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY NEWS



Elder Elona Street-Stewart (Executive of the Synod of Lakes and Prairies) and the Rev. Gregory Bentley (Pastor of Fellowship Presbyterian Church in Huntsville, Alabama) became the Co-Moderators of the 224th General Assembly. Their slogan is 'Learning from the past, living in the present.' The symbol they chose is the Sankofa bird standing in the Mississippi River. The bird embraces their Native American and African American cultures and echoes their slogan. The bird's feet are moving forward and at the same time the bird is looking back to take what is precious and wise from our past.

The Rev. Dr. J. Herbert Nelson II was elected to serve his second four-year term as our Stated Clerk. The assembly concluded with 8.46 minutes of silence and solidarity to join our voice with those around the country in a cry to end racial injustice.

Additionally, Dr. Kieffer and Rev. Choi were elected to serve on two G.A. committees: Committee on the General Assembly and Committee of Ecumenical and Interreligious Relations respectively, both in the Class of 2024.

MAY FINANCIAL REPORT by Lisa Runkle

Thank you for your faithfulness as the Operating Fund income is \$28,459 more than our budget through May 2020. Mission receipts are far above budget with recent donations to the HEAL Fund. Expenses are over budget by \$18,733. The property budget funded the tuckpointing project, and the mission expenditures are up to match the recent additional giving.

FREE LINCOLN LAND ONLINE COURSE: HISTORY OF **CHRISTIANITY TAUGHT BY PROFESSOR AARON BERKOWITZ**

HIS-299-02 is a special topics course at LLCC on the History of Christianity (August 24 – December 11, 2020). Because of the pandemic, the class will be offered online. Professor Aaron Berkowitz will provide recorded lectures throughout and students will participate in an online discussion board. The class covers Christianity from its origins in Judaism through to the present day. Textbooks include Mark Noll's Turning Points: Decisive Moments in the History of Christianity and the Norton Anthology of World Religion volume on Christianity. The book Turning Points features 14 of the most important moments in Christian history, with each chapter devoted to a different event. The Norton Anthology is a recent compilation of primary source materials related to Christian history.

As an online course, access to a computer is necessary; however, no special hardware or software is required other than a web browser. The class is being offered asynchronously, which means you can complete the course on your own schedule. Like all classes at Lincoln Land Community College, tuition is free for students over the age of 65. It is possible to take the class as an "auditor", which means that you would not have to do any of the assignments or receive a final grade, but you would still have access to the lectures and discussion boards. 



A Long Walk to Water by Linda Sue Park

The girl, Nya, is fetching water from a pond that is a two hour walk from her home: she makes two trips to the pond every day. The boy, Salva, becomes one of the "lost boys" of Sudan, refugees who cover the African continent on foot as they search for their families and for a safe place to stay. Grade 3 to adult.

Brown Girl Dreaming by Jacqueline Woodson

This memoir is written using poetry. She tells of her childhood as an African American in the American Northeast and South in the 1960s. Born in Columbus, Ohio, to the descendants of former slaves, Jacqueline is named after her father, Jack, much to the chagrin of her mother, Mary Ann. Grade 3 to adult.

One Crazy Summer by Rita Williams-Garcia

It is a children's novel of historical fiction, set during the summer of 1968 in Oakland, California. "One Crazy Summer" follows the lives of the Gaither sisters, Delphine, Vonetta, and Fern, as they visit with their mother who abandoned them some seven years before. Grade 3 to adult.

Mountains Beyond Mountains by Tracy Kidder

A true story of a gifted man who loves the world and has set out to do all he can to cure it. In medical school, Paul Farmer found his life's calling: to cure infectious diseases and to bring the lifesaving tools of modern medicine to those who need them most. Farmer changes minds and practices through his dedication to the philosophy that "the only real nation is humanity." "Beyond mountains there are mountains"—as you solve one problem, another problem presents itself, and so you go on and try to solve that one too. Grade 7 to adult.


